Welcome, Apologies and Housekeeping

Sam, Daniel and Graham welcomed everyone to the meeting and Sam read out the apologies.



Minutes from the last meeting

At the last meeting the District Partnership Groups came to share information on the work they have done as well work they are planning for the future. There were no actions from this meeting but Sam thanked everyone for the work that they put in to making the meeting a success.



Integrated Commissioning

Sue explained to the group about how commissioning will change in the future.

This will not change the service that people get, it will just mean that KCC and the NHS will work together to buy services in a better way.



What happens now?

The following groups all have money and contracts to buy services:

- Kent County Council (KCC)
- Ashford Clinical Commissioning Group (1)
- Canterbury and Coastal Clinical Commissioning Group (2)
- Dartford, Gravesham and Swanley Clinical Commissioning Group (3)
- South Kent Coast Clinical Commissioning Group (4)
- Swale Clinical Commissioning Group (5)
- Thanet Clinical Commissioning Group (6)
- West Kent Clinical Commissioning Group (7)



Integrated Commissioning (continued)

What will happen in the future?

There will be one team of people managed by KCC. This will be called the **Integrated Commissioning Board**.

How will this be better?

There will be people from NHS and KCC working together to:

- Agree a joint plan
- Check that services are working well
- Check how the money is being spent
- The money from NHS and KCC will be put together into one pot and used to buy services



This means that we might be able to get more for our money, there will continue to be good partnership working between the NHS and KCC and there will be better checks on services.

When will these changes happen?

These changes will happen on the 1st April 2016.



The new contract for the Community LD teams will come into place on the 1st April 2017.



So what we are saying is that we will have the Board in place this April and will start working together but teams out in the community will not start purchasing services through this new system until 2017

Helen Whately MP

Helen Whately gave a presentation on her work. Helen is the Member of Parliament (MP) for Faversham and Mid Kent.



At the end of the presentation, members of the Board asked the following questions:



What are you doing to help people with learning disabilities into work?



There is the Disability Confident event which will get employers together to talk about the positives of employing people with a learning disability.

We will be looking to do some matchmaking for people with learning disabilities that are looking for jobs and employers.

Steve Chapman told Helen that he had been working for a number of years to help people with learning disabilities to get into work.

Helen said that she would like to link with Steve and get him involved with the Disability Confident event. **Joanne to send Steve's contact details to Helen.**



Why are hospital waiting times so long? I have diabetes and had an appointment for 10.30 am but was not seen until 12.10 pm.

Helen Whately MP (continued)

A

I agree that it is bad when a hospital makes you wait this long. What I can do is write to the Minister if I get lots of complaints.

Unfortunately, I am not your MP as you live in Swanley. You would need to write to your MP as they will not know that there is a problem until you tell them.



In November, Kent's Health and Wellbeing Board met and GPs agreed that they wanted to improve waiting times and would work to put reasonable adjustments in place for people with learning disabilities.

Malti from Public Health is also doing a lot of work around diabetes and will feed this back to the Good Health Group.

Q

What are you doing to improve public transport for people with learning disabilities?

A

At the moment I am not doing anything. No one has told there was a problem. What is the problem?

Members of the Board explained that there is a lot of work happening locally to try and improve peoples' experiences. This includes making sure that bus drivers do not move the bus until people have sat down and to try and stop bullying on public transport.



Helen Whately MP (continued)

An issue that cannot be changed locally is that people with learning disabilities that have bus passes for travelling on buses cannot use these passes until 9.30 am. This is a problem for people trying to find work.

Kent would like to pay for people to use their passes earlier but does not have the funds.

Helen is soon to have a meeting with Arriva to talk about buses being late for schools. **Whilst at the meeting Helen will ask Arriva about concessions and giving people more time to get on the bus.**

Helen will write to the Minister about this issue and will either come back to the meeting to give an update or will give feedback to Joanne.



With all of the changes happening to the benefit system, how are people with learning disabilities going to understand what is happening?

The accessible information standard that becomes law in July 2016 is only for health and social care. It would be helpful if the Department of Works and Pensions (DWP) also used this.

(The accessible information standard tells organisations how they should make sure that disabled people get information in a way they understand.)



Helen will add this to her letter to the Minister and feedback to the Board.

Helen Whately MP (continued)



Why are there not more advocacy groups to help people understand information, such as letters from the Department of Works and Pensions (DWP) or GPs?



I agree with our earlier conversation that information from any government agency should be accessible.

Penny told Helen that KCC does fund independent advocacy but due to cuts is no longer able to fund group advocacy. There is some group advocacy in Kent but this is run locally and is not KCCs legal responsibility.



With the recent challenges to the bedroom tax in the appeal court, do you think that the bedroom tax is unlawful?



As an MP I see people from both sides of the argument. Some people feel that they need their spare room for grandchildren who visit or storing goods needed for medical purposes.

On the other hand, I see people with children who desperately need housing and if someone has a room that they don't need, a larger family could use it.

The Under Occupancy Charge (otherwise known as the bedroom tax) does have exemptions. Write to your MP if you are affected and think you should be exempt.

We will use this to get standards in place at long stay hospitals.

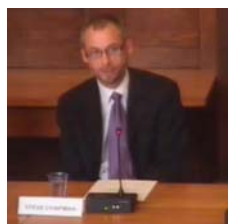
